Trees will be judged the week after Christmas by a panels of judges to be determined.



2024 SOLAR ECIPSE UPDATE


Do you remember the total solar eclipse that crossed the continental United States from coast to coast on August 21, 2017?

If you lived in, or traveled into, the 70-mile-wide path of totality, where the Moon completely blocked the Sun and turned day into night for 2 minutes or so, you undoubtedly remember it well.

The 2017 total solar eclipse was the first to touch the "Lower 48" since 1979 and the first to span the U.S. from coast to coast since 1918.

Remarkably, another total solar eclipse is coming to North America on April 8, 2024, just seven years after the last one.

This time the Moon's dark central shadow, about 115 miles wide, will cross Mexico, sweep northeast from



Texas to Maine, and then darken parts of Eastern Canada. A partial solar eclipse will be visible to nearly everyone in North America fortunate to have cloudfree skies.

During a total solar eclipse, the Moon blocks the Sun's bright face—the photosphere— briefly revealing our star's outer atmosphere: the shimmering corona or "crown".

Made of rarefied gas heated to millions of degrees, with its atoms highly ionized (stripped of electrons), the diaphanous corona gets sculpted into streamers and loops by the Sun's powerful magnetic field and shines with a light seen nowhere else. It is hauntingly beautiful and, without doubt, one of the most awesome sights in all of nature.

The Sandusky County Commissioners serve as administrators for Sandusky County by:


- Formulating a Multi-million Dollar Budget;

The purpose of I.G.N.I.T.E. is to offer comprehensive, merit based programming. Classes include education, career training, mental health, and substance abuse. We partner with local employers to help with postrelease employment and provide follow up services in the community upon release.

With national recidivism rates at an all-time high, and the punitive nature of the criminal justice system, we as a community must come together to change the culture of incarceration. We work with our incarcerated individuals to provide necessary skills for successful reentry. We are committed to supporting these individuals as they strive to regain a sense of value, hope, and purpose in their lives.



Did you know...

In 2022 Sandusky County had:

1,430 jail admissions

92% were held in jail awaiting trial

15% went to prison

Meaning, 85% of those incarcerated were returned to our communities.

While in jail, many individuals lose their jobs, health care, homes, and means of transportation.

Incarceration can increase the symptoms of mental illness, such as anxiety and depression. Often it disrupts family and support systems and can lead to a sense of helplessness and a lack of purpose.

I.G.N.I.T.E. is designed to reduce the negative impacts of incarceration while improving the skills necessary to be successful upon reentry.
