USPS POSTAL INCREASE

As of **July 13, 2025**, the USPS is increasing mailing service prices by a minimum of 7.4%.

- **First-Class Mail (Stamps):** The price of a Forever stamp will increase from 73 cents to 78 cents.
- **First-Class Mail (Metered):** The price for a 1-ounce metered letter will increase from 69 cents to 74 cents. We receive the metered rate, however, this price increases based on the weight of the letter/package.
- **Postcards:** The price will increase from 56 cents to 62 cents.
- **International Letter:** A 1-ounce letter will increase from \$1.65 to \$1.70.
- **Certified Mail:** This cost will also increase. A standard 1-ounce letter will increase from \$9.64 to \$10.44. These prices increase based on the weight of the letter/package.
- **The Certificate of Mailing:** Will remain at \$2.20 per form, as far as I can tell.

SANDUSKY COUNTY COMMUNITIES FOUNDATION

The Sandusky County Communities Foundation (SCCF) has announced the creation of the Lee N. Koenig Legacy Fund, which will invest between \$5.6 million and \$7.6 million over the next five years.

The fund will support causes in education, historical preservation, health care and community development.

The SCCF is collaborating with the Greater Toledo Community Foundation to manage the Lee N. Koenig Legacy Fund. This partnership aims to ensure the long-term impact and thoughtful distribution of the funds in accordance with Koenig's wishes.

The Legacy Fund represents the largest amount of charitable distributions from a single fund in the foundation's history.

TICK, TICK, TICK



Ticks are very prevalent this season. Make sure you are checking yourself, children and pets whenever you spend time in wooded, grassy or brushy areas. Stick to trails when hiking and avoid direct contact with vegetation.

To avoid ticks, use repellents containing DEET, wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants - tucking pants into socks or boots, and wear light colored clothing to easily spot ticks.

Check your body and clothing for ticks after spending time outdoors. Pay close attention to areas like underarms, groin, behind the ears and the scalp. Shower soon after being outdoors to wash off any unattached ticks.

Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible, pull the tick away from the skin with a steady, even motion. Clean the bite area with soap and water or rubbing alcohol. Save the tick for identification by your doctor or local health department.

Visible progress has been made on the new EMS station in Gibsonburg. The walls are going up now and they anticipate a September completion date for the facility.



AMERICAN HEART ASSOCIATION RECOGNITION

Sandusky County EMS has been recognized by the American Heart Association for their commitment to providing research-based, high-quality heart attack and stroke care with a Mission: Lifeline Gold Achievement Award.

What does that entail? ST-elevation myocardial infarction (STEMI) patients need a 12 lead acquired within 10 minutes of EMS arrival and transported to a Cath Lab capable hospital all within 90 minutes of initial patient contact. Along with STEMI data, they acquire data for strokes to ensure stroke patients are getting the appropriate assessment and are efficiently transported to a Comprehensive Stroke Center.

STEMI is a severe type of heart attack where a major coronary artery is completely blocked, causing significant damage to the heart muscle due to oxygen deprivation. It's a medical emergency requiring immediate treatment to restore blood flow and minimize damage.

Pictured below is Troy, a patient from April 2025, who was experiencing chest pain. LS-18 responded and he was quickly transported to Fireland's for an emergent heart catheterization. Troy and his wife, Trina, came to visit the crew that saved him that day - Lieutenant Dewyre, Paramedic Boes, and EMT Boyd. Troy was beyond thankful for their quick recognition of a STEMI and transporting him to the appropriate facility in under 90 minutes.



LAW ENFORCEMENT TORCH RUN

Local law enforcement, Special Olympians, friends, neighbors, and the Sandusky County Board of Developmental Disabilities team laced up and joined forces for the Law Enforcement Torch Run in support of Special Olympics Ohio.

Together, they proudly carried the Flame of Hope from Anderson Field near Potter Village, made a spirited stop at the MACC on North Street, continued down Franklin Street to the Fremont Police Department, and crossed the finish line at the FOP Lodge #35.

A huge thank you to the Sandusky County Board of Developmental Disabilities, local law enforcement (Sheriff's Office, Fremont Police Department and State Highway Patrol), and all of the incredible first responders (EMT personnel and fire departments). INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF EMERGENCY MANAGERS USA 2025 VIRTUAL SUNSHINE SUMMIT

Lisa Kuelling-Sandusky County EMA Director, along with Erie County EMA Director, Tim Jonovich, were the opening presenters for the 2025 International Association of Emergency Managers Virtual Sunshine Summit on June 17th.

Their one-hour presentation topic was the 2022 Ohio Turnpike incident. Fifty-one vehicles were involved in the multi-vehicle crash that spanned several miles across Sandusky and Erie counties and closed the Turnpike in both directions. There were four fatalities and 73 injuries.

The weather conditions including high winds, blowing snow and frigid temperatures factored into the crash. The air temperature was 4 degrees above zero, but strong winds with snow made it feel like minus 50 degrees at times. First responders battled through these horrific conditions to assist those in need.

The International Association of Emergency Managers (IAEM) has more than 6,000 members worldwide, is a non-profit educational organization dedicated to promoting the "Principles of Emergency Management" and representing those professionals whose goals are saving lives and protecting property and the environment during emergencies and disasters.

ADOPTION REQUIREMENTS

BEST FRIENDS ANIMAL SOCIETY RECOGNITION

According to Best Friends Animal Society's annual data report, the Sandusky County Dog Kennel saved more than 90% of the dogs that entered their shelter last year.

Dog Warden, Kelly Pocock, noted that even though 2024 is the first year they have been recognized by the Best Friends Animal Society as a no-kill facility, they have been no-kill since 2019. As they began to work towards a no-kill kennel, they knew their dogs would end up staying with them longer. They work diligently to ensure the dogs get daily enrichment in a variety of ways to keep them mentally and physically healthy. They meet the dogs where they are. If they are fearful, they give them extra time to decompress. They are proud to say that their Save Rate for 2024 was 95%.

Animal Control or Dog Warden's offices have long been portrayed in a negative light, even in movies, but they have been working hard to change that.



I.G.N.I.T.E. UPDATE

A couple years ago, the Sandusky County Jail was the first in Ohio to launch IGNITE which stands for Inmate Growth Naturally and Intentionally through Education.

It started in 2020 in Flint MI where the Sheriff wanted to shift the jail's culture and reduce the rate of people returning to the jail - called recidivism. So they started offering courses to teach skills like financial literacy and parenting.

Since then, the National Sheriff's Association has adopted the program and it's spread to more than 25 jails across the country.

IGNITE Program Administrator, Caren Nemitz, stated that the program looks different at every site. There are some sites that are bigger and they have a lot of money and there are some sites like ours that are really rural that do not have a lot of money. She stated that we have a lot of people with drug issues and then they have mental health or a trauma aspect also. She has been focusing on education and support for mental health and trauma issues.

Sandusky County's IGNITE program has been funded with grants from the United Way and a local Mental Health and Addiction Services Board. Now, it's being supplemented with a \$172,291 Opioid Remediation Grant from the State Attorney General's Office. The monies are intended to get incarcerated people access to treatment and reduce the number of fatal overdoses in Ohio jails.



WORLD ELDER ABUSE AWARENESS EVENT



Adult Protection proudly hosted two pop-up events in honor of World Elder Abuse Awareness Day. The morning event was held at the Clyde gazebo with their SRO partners and another event was held in Fremont at Share and Care.

The events were to raise awareness, provide resources, and stand in solidarity with older adults everywhere. Every person deserves to age with dignity, respect and safety.


